MONTH'S SUPPLY OF HOUSING INVENTORY

AS OF APRIL 2019



King County had **1.69 months' supply** of inventory
(up from 0.94 months' of inventory a year ago)



Snohomish County had **1.29 months' supply** of inventory
(up from 0.84 a year ago)

Many industry analysts consider a four-to-six-month level as an indicator of a healthy market.

MEDIAN HOME PRICE

APRIL 2019



The median price of single family homes and condos was **\$625,000** in King County and **\$479,000** in Snohomish County.



For single family homes only, the median price in King County fell 4.83 percent, from \$725,000 a year ago to **\$690,000**. The median price in Snohomish County fell 1.18 percent, from \$505,975 to **\$500,000**.

In Seattle, the median single family home price for March was **\$754,000**, a 7.94 percent decrease from April 2018.

BUILDING PERMITS

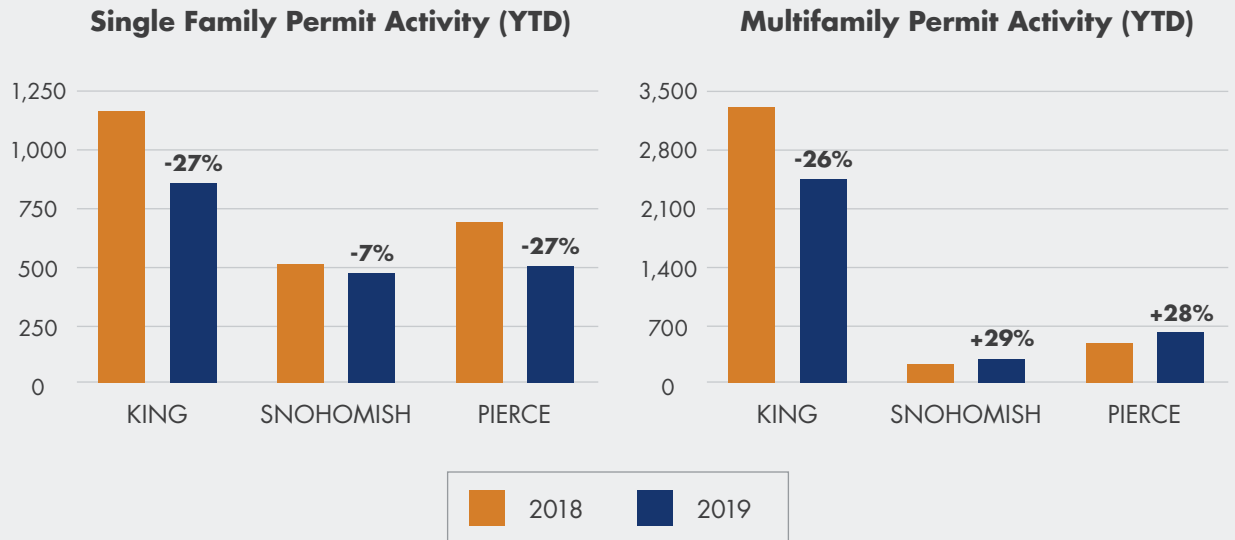
The following building permit data is for the Seattle Metro Area (including King, Snohomish, and Pierce counties).

JOBS

Between 2010 and 2017, the Puget Sound Region added 362,800 jobs. We've added over three jobs for every housing unit.



The Washington unemployment rate for April 2019 is 4.7% and for Seattle/Bellevue/Everett it is **3.5%**.

Construction employment in Washington fell by 1,100 between March 2019 and April 2019. Total employment in construction is **221,600 statewide**.
